Pontcysyllte Chapel Tearoom





We are pleased to announce that after a lengthy restoration project we have opened the chapel tearoom doors to the public .

Built in 1902 to replace the smaller chapel near the Aqueduct, Bryn Seion was built by local craftsmen out of JC Edwards brick .The builder was Mr JT Jones of Cefn Mawr and work was supervised by Mr John Price of Trefynant Works. The chapel first opened its doors in May 1903 at a total cost of £1800 ! The stunning ceiling and beautifully crafted 'seat fawr' and pulpit look as impressive today as they must have done 115 years ago.

Since its closure as a chapel in 1992 it has been used as an antique centre, auction house and latterly as a storage unit. The building was neglected and increasingly the target of vandals and an eyesore for the local area. As a grade 2 listed building, it was a challenge to restore and keep the original features but at the same time add a contemporary feel. However, this has been done and it is a light, airy, welcoming space with a great 'feeling' inside.

The Chapel has been brought back to life and is once again a hub of the local community. Young and old alike meeting up for a good chat over a leisurely drink and cake or lunch.

Many customers have special memories of their time spent in the chapel at school plays, Sunday school, weddings, baptisms, funerals and even youth club. We would love to see some photographs if anyone would like to share with us.

We are thankful for the support we have received from all our customers and the great feedback and comments on the restoration project. Moving forward, we would welcome suggestions on what you as our customers would like to see happening at the chapel and also on the menu.

We are open daily serving breakfasts, lunches, cakes, snacks and ice cream. Our food is sourced locally and all freshly made. We have an alcohol licence and can cater for parties for up to 60. We have hosted birthday parties for young ladies aged 8 to 90 years young ! So whatever the occasion we can accommodate you. We have just been awarded a 5* food hygiene rating and are looking forward to our official opening in June when we will be welcoming the tourism minister of Wales.

The tearoom are open daily from 10-5, all freshly prepared food using local suppliers, traditional afternoon teas, delicious homemade bara brith.

Private events catered for e.g. birthday parties ,anniversary celebrations, christenings, and various meetings.

- 4. Place mixture into a fully lined 9inch cake tin and bake for 1-1.5 hours gas mark 4 or 180c in a fan oven.

As summer approaches Police and local authorities receive an increasing number of reports regarding concerns for animals and even children in parked cars but mainly cases of dogs.

Even during relatively mild weather, a car can quickly heat up in the sun, despite the outside temperature feeling fairly cool. During the heat experienced recently and hopefully in the months to come, vehicles can turn deadly.

Unlike humans, dogs pant to help keep themselves cool. In a hot stuffy car dogs can't cool down - parking in the shade, leaving a window open or a sunshield on the windscreen won't keep a car cool enough and a dog could die.

The following signs of an animal that is in danger of death by heatstroke:

- Excessive panting
- Excessive drooling
- Increased heart rate
- Trouble breathing
- Disorientation
- Collapse or loss of consciousness
- Seizure
- Respiratory arrest

Dinas Bran School

ERASMUS AT DINAS BRAN

22 students, along with accompanying teachers, attended a week at Dinas Brân, from the 5th to the 9th March. Hosted by 6th Form/Year 11 students, they looked at various links and challenges between minority languages.

The project was set up in 2016 and is called 'Champions of Culture'. The countries involved have been Finland, Poland, Switzerland, Italy, Scotland and Wales. Each country has their own minority language and the project has been working on how we can protect and promote each minority. Participants have been looking at how minority languages and cultures survive and thrive in the different countries. Through working on the project, it has become clear how important each minority language is to their culture and their identity. Each country has worked on a number of tasks in a number of workshops and has identified that there are many similarities and challenges in each minority.

A group of Welsh speaking Dinas Brân pupils has been developing this theme, over the last couple of years, interspersed with various visits to the other schools in Finland, Poland and Italy.

The visitors were officially welcomed by the Acting Headteacher Mr Hatch and the Mayor of Llangollen. In addition to the specific project based work that was undertaken, the European visitors had the chance to make a Welsh love spoon, cook some traditional Welsh food, take part in drama workshops, learn some Welsh and be a part of a Noson Lawen. They also visited various locations in North Wales such as Portmeirion, Llanberis and Porthmadog.

The week in Wales was focussed on showing how Welsh is very much a part of everyday life. We welcomed Welsh speaking guests from the Urdd, BBC Wales, Capital Radio along with other individuals known for their promotion of the use of the Welsh language. They all led presentations and then held question and answer sessions with all participating students. The speakers explained how Welsh is an integral part of their professional life and what they do to promote the use of the language.

The last step? Each country will be organising a festival in their respective schools, to showcase what they have been doing within the context of the project and the impact it has had on the students and the schools involved.

The week was an unqualified success, with the European teachers commenting on how warm the Welsh welcome was even with the challenges that the snow storm presented. The students had a fantastic time and the week was rounded up with a night of bowling in Wrexham and a series of lovely if tearful goodbyes.
